1 MEETINGS

2 REPORTS

2.1 Observing Evening Report Michael Poll

The Observing evenings this year have been only moderately successful. Three evenings (September, February and March) were cancelled due to the weather – even postponing the February and March evenings for a week did not help – the clouds persisted. The attendance of an average of about ten people has not been as good as in times past, and even this average was boosted by the January event when with visitors and friends, families and children, about 30 people were present. Butat the postponed-fora-week April event only two people turned up and for the May evening only the same two people from April were there, and only five came in June.

However, when there was attendance there were always a sufficient number of telescopes. It was pleasing to note that on one of the evenings the attendance included a couple of visitors from Johannesburg from the telescope making class..

The sky brightness precluded us from seeing all but the brightest objects including double stars, bright nebulae and clusters. Even on the best evening, in the sky we had we could only just about make out the Square of Pegasus with the naked eye. In November we glimpsed the Andromeda galaxy - it reflects on the quality of the City sky when we get excited about seeing an object with difficulty in a telescope which is an easy naked eye catch in a dark place. The Moon was present on a couple of occasions, and a number of craters were identified on both the east and west limbs.

A comprehensive list of the objects seen, including the Lunar 100 **"L"** numbers, is recorded in the Observing Evening Report each month in Centre Newsletter.

2.5 Telescope Making Class, including ScopeX: Johan Smit

- Johan Smit serves as permanent instructor from Pretoria at the class.

- In October 2024, there were three new members, and by January 2025 further members had joined. Some telescopes were nearly completed although it took time to finish them. Membership increased again in April 2025 when three further members joined, and some telescopes were being finished.

2.6 Curator of instruments: Johan Smit & Johan Jordaan

We have not been using the 12-inch telescope. For practical purposes the telescope is unlikely to be used in the foreseeable future although it can be shown to visitors.

Added to this is the fact that we are now holding our observing evenings on the cricket field, so we do not use the sports field where the dome is located.

2.7 Observing (WhatsApp Group): Neville Young

- People who are interested are invited to join the group to "see what we do". Our Centre meeting dates are circulated to the Group.
- The Group has been active especially with monitoring T Corona Borealis and Comet Tsuchinshan-ATLAS, and Nova V0462 Lupi.
- Percy Jacobs has been continuing with his spectroscopy work.
- Many excellent astrophotos have been circulated.
- A number of new members joined the Group during the year, including some who are not members of the Centre, but we do not exclude them as we wish to foster an interest in astronomy.
- Some of the members are novices and so some of their posts are basic or are educational queries.
- Some of the photos submitted by novices are not the best, but this is not a problem, and constructive criticism is offered.
- The Committee considered the question as to whether posts from and responses to novices will put off serious observers who are making and reporting in-depth observations should there be two groups?
- It is good thing if novices are exposed to serious observations it may stimulate them to go further. It does not matter if they cannot handle it.
- If there are two groups the novices may not see the serious stuff and so may not be exposed to what is being done.
- Serious observers need not necessarily be involved with novices if they do not wish to be so.
 Decided: To keep one group as it will keep less experienced members exposed to science.
